## FROM THE MINISTER...

One thing that I will not miss during the five months of my sabbatical is driving on Highway 41. I don't know what it is about this highway, but people seem to undergo personality changes on this road, myself included. And these are not positive personality changes. Kindness, patience and goodwill seem to disappear as soon as folks get on the entrance ramps. Of course, I am realistic enough to know that I will be exchanging driving on Highway 41 for driving in Las Vegas traffic, which makes 41 seem like a quiet country road.

Driving most anywhere is a challenge. Wouldn't it be wonderful if I -- and everyone else -- could practice some of the primary Buddhist teachings when out there zipping along in high-speed, high-volume traffic? Despite the fact that I often describe myself as a Buddhist humanist, I am not always successful at following the "Best of Buddhism" behavior.

I suppose that I could attribute my lapses to the fact that I have too much on my mind these days as I prepare to leave Green Bay for a few months. But, that is a cop-out, unfair to Buddhism. The very purpose of mindfulness, one of the most important of Buddhist teachings, is to un-clutter the mind. My mindlessness is both the result and the cause of too much clutter; I have not been meditating regularly.

Similarly, I think that our fast-paced way of life, exemplified on the highways, is both the cause and result of our failure to be mindful and practice loving-kindness. We are trapped in a vicious cycle. Lately, there has been a flurry of stories about rudeness and our failure to be civil to each other, events ranging from the tennis court to the highest arena of government. What is going on here? Are there more rude, thoughtless people now than there were 100 or 50 or 25 years ago? Or are there more people in the world, getting in each other's way?

Or have we taken the cult of the individual to ridiculous extremes at the expense of community? I think that is where the answer lies. Recently, I was appalled at the responses people gave to a television interviewer when asked their opinion about health care, particularly when the interviewer posed this question: "Do you want your tax money going to help those less fortunate?" One after another, people said, "No!" even when the interviewer pointed out that we already pool our tax money to build community, schools being one excellent example.

I would have answered, "Yes!" to the question. Yes, I do want my tax dollars going to help others, to build good communities. It frustrates and saddens me that it can be difficult to find community and the building blocks of community: calmness, kindness, goodwill and patience. I believe these things are all "out there", but we don't hear enough about them.

Community is just as important as individualism. I am so thankful that there is a place called the Green Bay Area Unitarian Universalist Fellowship, a community in which we can build friendships and practice being kind, calm, patient and in the moment. Blessings on all of you who make up this remarkable community!

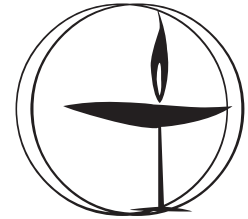

## FROM THE PRESIDENT...

Our Third Town Hall Meeting was held on Sunday, September 13 with over 35 individuals remaining after services. It was an opportunity for our Fellowship to revisit topics of interest to our membership, share plans for the final months of 2009 and review our current financial status. A brief recap of my opening comments and general themes included:

- 1) Currently our Fellowship has 84 book signed members with 9 new members joining since the end of March 2009;
- 2) Our fundraisers and rent renegotiation relieved some financial concerns for 2008-2009. However, the current economy still presents challenges for this budget year. The Board is looking to re-establish a contingency fund with the upcoming sabbatical of our minister. Specific questions can be addressed to our Board Co-Treasurers;
- 3) Our minister's sabbatical will be from November 1, 2009 to April 1, 2010. Questions on implementation, pastoral care and services during this time can be directed to any member of the current Board; and
- 4) Our fellowship is currently in the midst of growth which is the direction our membership has wanted and worked for years to achieve. But moving from a Family Congregation (less than 75 members) to a Program Congregation (75-150 members) brings growing pains, communication concerns and other challenges for leadership, structure and administration. It is important to empower our Board to move us in this direction, to delegate/charge our committees to make critical decisions and to encourage our members to help this process unfold and stabilize.

During this Town Hall Meeting, several good points and discussion items were raised. This is exactly why these events are important to hold regularly. Rest assured that the Board is aware of many of these items and we will work hard to update our members on progress and resolution of these points/items. Specifically those points raised/discussed included:

- 1) use of and rental of the Fellowship (for potential income source);
- 2) membership growth (over 85 individuals were at services today even with many long-time members/friends not in attendance);
- 3) visibility in the community;
- 4) assistance from the Central Midwest District of the UUA (possible consultant);
- 5) care/nurturing of our Fellowship;
- 6) lay leader training (specifically in areas of pastoral care);
- 7) communication improvements/enhancements;
- 8) respecting, understanding and balancing confidentiality/privacy issues with caring/nurturing needs of our members.

In closing, I wanted to thank everyone for listening, participating and contributing to this Town Hall meeting. The free flowing discussion was an excellent start to the church year. This combined with the Volunteer/Involvement Fair, the start of religious education the following week, the kick-off to the annual Service Auction and the welcoming congregation process commencing in less than 2 weeks means exciting, invigorating and engaging times ahead. I look forward to seeing many of you in the weeks ahead.

## TAKING "STOCK" IN OUR YOUTH

The 8<sup>th</sup>-12<sup>th</sup> grade class is participating in a program entitled: *Youth Today: Paradigms Lost*, where they are discussing sacred life skills that will help them mature into healthy and spiritual young adults. You are invited to participate in the game component of this program. It is easy to do, and you may find it rewarding. It would be a big help to the youth by showing how our adult community cares about them and values their presence.

They are discussing life skills in the context of good management practices, such as planning, goal setting, prioritizing, etc. Each youth in the program will create a "company" of their life and will be earning stock in their company through their actions for the next several months.

The game works as follows. There is an envelope hanging on the office window labeled "Stock Certificates". In it you will find small packets of stock certificates. If you would like to participate in the program, please take just one packet of stocks and do the following. Whenever you see a youth (from the 8-12<sup>th</sup> grade class) do something that emulates one of the personality traits listed on one of the stock certificates, then give that youth the stock certificate for that trait. For instance, if a youth helps another find or understand something, then you can give the youth a "Seeking" stock. If you see a youth helping to coordinate an activity, you can give them an "Organized" stock certificate. And so on.

For the final tally at the end of the game, a youth can receive no more than two stocks from any one person. This way, no one can "stack" the game in anyone's favor. Otherwise we strongly encourage you to help the youth earn their stocks.

We hope that your participation will enhance our program by adding an intergenerational component. You will benefit by seeing our youth in action and they will benefit in turn from your care and contribution.

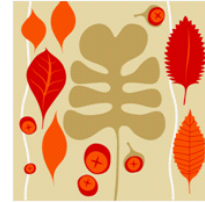

## SERVICE TOPIC PREVIEW

**October 4 -- “Reflections on Rescue: Breaking and Repairing the Human/Animal Bond” by Claudia Moder.** This will be an exploration of spiritual connections made between people and animals with specific examples from her decade spent working with homeless dogs.

**October 11 -- “Do I Have To?” Reflections from Rev. Ingham** on the possibility of reclaiming our innocence, our child-like nature. Even if we could do this, would we really want to do so? Rev. Ingham believes that we are compelled to do this, although we might use different language to describe what we hope to accomplish. For the sake of our children, ourselves and Mother Earth, we have to reclaim, proclaim, sustain that child-like wonder that we too often lose as we get older. A child dedication will also be part of this service.

**October 18 -- “An Excess of Riches” by Rev. Ingham.** On this Sunday, Rev. Ingham will celebrate Unitarian Universalism in general, and the Green Bay Fellowship in particular. We will take a look at where we have been and where we think we are going. What’s next in the Fellowship’s exciting journey? This Sunday is New Member Recognition Sunday.

**October 25-- “The Chalice and the Flame” by Reverend Paul Beckel.** When UU congregations gather, we often begin by lighting a chalice. What might this mean for us together? The unpredictable dance of the spirit supported upon a base of reason? The light of individual freedom held up for the world by a solid caring community? What does it mean to you? Reverend Beckel is the minister at the Wausau Universalist Unitarian Church.

**November 1-- “United Nations Sunday” by Bette McAnulty.** October 24 has been called United Nations Day. In 1971, the United Nations General Assembly adopted a resolution recommending that the day be observed as a public holiday by Member States. In celebration of this annual event, the Unitarian Universalist United Nations Office (UU-UNO) invites congregations and individual UUs to deepen their understanding of the United Nations by devoting one service near this date to reaffirm the connections between UU principles and vital issues dealt with at the UN.
